# Traveling the Globe on a Cruise Ship: Part 1

Michaele and Charlie Wezwick have circled the globe twice in four years, visiting dozens of countries and spending many months living on cruise ships. In this article, Michaele describes how the couple prepared for their months-long cruises.

### The Best of all Worlds

Why a world cruise? There are many places Charlie and I always wanted to visit ... Australia, New Zealand, Madagascar, Israel, Egypt ... even an African safari was on our bucket list. To do everything would involve planning multiple land and sea tours, many years and, well, lots of cash. In 2021, we booked a four-month Viking world cruise that saved us time and money.

On a cruise, the world is literally at our doorstep. There's no battling traffic, dealing with airport crowds, or moving luggage over and over again. It's one and done! The ship offers great accommodations and great company. And my ears don't pop so often with altitude changes!

Four years ago, we started our global adventure in Fort Lauderdale, went through the Panama Canal, around South America, across the Atlantic, and through the Suez Canal (both directions) due to COVID-related closures in the Pacific and finished in Bergen, Norway. In January of this year, we boarded our cruise at Port St. Pedro in Los Angeles with an itinerary intended to cross the Pacific, but we were rerouted around Africa due to the war in Israel. We ended our cruise in London this year.

## Preparing to be Away for 120 Days

Wow, four months away from home! We are blessed to have relatives living in the community who can check on our house and collect our mail on a regular basis. (They even culled the junk mail!)

What about medical prescriptions that need to be refilled every three months? Talk with your doctor and pharmacist to ensure your meds are available when you need them.

## What to Pack?

Packing ... oy! We planned to do laundry at least every 10 days, so 10 sets of clothing, including socks and underwear, worked well. We packed layers because we were visiting multiple climates. There were no formal nights on our cruise, so nice tops and slacks and skirts worked all day. Comfortable, waterproof walking and hiking shoes are a must, especially for visiting historical places with uneven terrain and negotiating docks and tenders.

The cruise ship provided shower gel, body lotion, shampoo, conditioner, and bar soap. Pack other personal items or purchase them in the ship's store or when you are in port. Don't forget over-the-counter drugs.

Viking let us ship one 40-pound suitcase directly to our cabin two weeks prior to embarkation. We checked two bags, giving us three suitcases plus carry-ons for the duration of the trip.

## Don't Leave Home Without ...

- A phone lanyard. They are convenient and deter theft. We were warned about thieves on motorbikes snatching phones out of tourists' hands.
- A light, foldable, waterproof backpack for excursions.
   It allows you to bring layers, rain gear, water bottles,
   hats, etc. Plus, it can carry your souvenirs.
- Magnetic hooks and shelving for additional storage in your cabin. Cabin walls and ceilings are magnetic



### The Plan for the Water Treatment Plant

Brunswick County officials decided to expand the Northwest Water Treatment Plant facility while adding reverse osmosis treatment to remove these chemicals. The project has experienced delays and after the contractor missed recent critical deadlines, the county decided to remove them. This undoubtedly will lead to additional delays in project completion.

Meanwhile, the county is suing DuPont/Chemours to recover costs; this litigation is ongoing with no end in



### What Should You Do?

The current situation makes it difficult to determine when Winding River's drinking water will be free of forever chemicals. What seemed like months could now take years; predicting the timeline for clean water is challenging.

Option 1 - Remove PFAS from water in your house with filtration systems: activated carbon filters, reverse osmosis filters, ion exchange resins.

Option 2 – Use bottled water for drinking and cooking.

**Option 3** – Ignoring the problem may be a viable short-term strategy for some, but the risk grows over prolonged use.

# It's Good To Know Where The AEDs Can Be Found

Next time you are at the POC, Fitness Center, River House or Beach House, take a few minutes to look around and see where the emergency medical equipment is located. It could be a matter of life or death.

- POC: Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) and first aid kits are located on the wall outside the Dogwood Room, in the Fitness Center on the wall near the entry, outside the Fitness Center on the wall between the restrooms, on the fence around the pool near the pump house. First aid kits are also located in the POC kitchen and in the PMO office.
- River House: an AED and first aid kit are located inside the building on the left wall near the French doors and an AED is on the marine dock to the left of the
- Beach House: AEDs are located upstairs in the gathering room on the wall across from the counter and on the wall underneath the deck at pool level. First aid kits are available outside between the bathrooms, in the gathering room in the second drawer of the counter, and outside next to the AED at the pool.
- 911 phones and fire alarms are also located in each of the amenities.

AEDs are indispensable devices and can significantly increase the chances of survival for someone experiencing sudden cardiac arrest (SCA). With the use of an AED, the survival rate can be as high as 70 percent. Knowing their location is step one in being helpful during an emergency. C.A.R.E.S. manages maintenance and repair of the AEDs.



# A Curious Beginning for Street Names in Southport

We've probably all heard the refrain "How Dry I Am." Its early roots are debated, but Irving Berlin included the ditty in a 1919 Zigfield Follies vignette, "The Near Future," referencing an experience of ordering a drink in a dry restaurant. So, what does this have to do with Southport?



Southport, originally known as Smithville, was a dry city from 1903 to 1937. The first ABC store was not built until 1957. Several streets were named after important historical figures: Lord Street was named after William Espey Lord, Howe Street was named after Robert Howe Sr., and Dry Street was named after William Dry.



In the 1950's, the telephone company was mapping streets in Southport and complained



about a two-block alley that runs parallel to Howe Street, having no name. Enter a problem-solving city clerk with a dry sense of humor. Why not name it "I Am," finishing the line, Lord! How Dry I Am. Was this a comment referring to the alcohol desert that existed in the 1950's or the whim of a city clerk with a sense of humor or both? Some of the churches and residents were not amused and argued against the name because it seemed undignified. Despite the controversy, the name prevails and reminds us to inject some fun into everyday life.

# Last Chance for Treasure Hunters at Olde Church Antiques

Have you lived here long enough to remember Worms & Coffee on the corner of Rt 211 and Midway Road? It was there, well, forever. Now it's only a memory in the dust of the Lowe's gas station.

That similar fate awaits Olde Church Antiques, the unique, statuesque pink brick building on Blanton Road near the Supply Post Office and Rt 17. In the near future, owner Larry Shakelford and his wife Joyce tell us they will be gone – taken over by a government agency. They are not sure exactly why but it has something to do with progress and road reconstruction at that intersection.

The structure was built in 1948 for use as a Baptist Church when life was slower paced and Sundays were spent gathering around a shared faith, food and friendship. The Shakelfords have operated their antiques business on the site for 35 years. Originally owners of a junk store in Southport, they sold items that intrigued them. Over time, they learned the trade from antique dealers and estate sale people.

They got up early and drove to the far corners of the county to find treasures you might enjoy.

Now they are faced with liquidation of their three floors of items. Everything is 50 percent off the tag and some things have been marked down. A cash offer will get you the best price. Do you collect German beer steins, old cookie jars or 100-year- old kitchen utensils? Look here first.

Rain and storm water keep the basement damp so dress accordingly and hold the handrail on the stairs for your safety. Bring your smile and good nature and hunt for that treasure you just have to have.

# Artistry in the Community: Bill Proffitt's Inspired Sculptures

Where were you when you last saw a piece of art that was awe inspiring? The Louvre, the Prado, the National Gallery of Art, the Winding River Grille ...?? Indeed, the art installation at the Carolina National Golf Clubhouse offers an experience that will stop you in your tracks, prompting the question, "How did they do that?" Winding River resident Bill Proffitt, the artist behind these pieces, admits that he sometimes looks at his bird sculptures on display there and thinks, "I don't know how I did that."

After retiring, Bill and Judy Proffitt moved to Winding River in 2002, which they say may qualify them as "pioneers." Over the past 23 years, they have been cultivating connections and sharing their talents. A recent visit to their home revealed Bill's lifelong passion for art—a pursuit that began in high school shop and art classes and has been nurtured ever since. His early furniture pieces, crafted from driftwood, lumber, and other found wood, led to more intricate creations in recent years.

His eye was drawn to local boats and he decided he would make a replica. Armed with photos of a Holden Beach shrimp boat and without plans, he created "Wesley's Pride," to grace a prominent spot in his house.

Fish and bird sculptures came next, painting each species with remarkable accuracy. Copper accents, a favorite of Judy's, have also graced many of Bill's later sculptures. The fish may be his favorite subjects, but the birds are definitely

the Winding River Grille took more than three months of meticulous work, involving intricate layering and careful brushwork.

Each room of the Proffitts' house holds examples of Bill's artistic talents, even the laundry room! "I don't want the house to look like a museum," Judy says, so she's happy that their daughter now has a vacation home at Holden Beach where Bill can display many of his pieces.

Quietly dedicated to his craft, Bill creates primarily for family, friends, and the occasional charity event, without any fanfare. Of his work at Carolina National, he says "There are the Ibis, Egret and Heron nine hole courses, but none of those birds appear in the clubhouse decor." His sculptures now bring these avian icons into the newly renovated restaurant space. Be sure to seek out Bill's sculptures on display the next time you dine at the Winding River Grille.

# Iconic Thalian Hall - Wimington's Crown Jewel

Located in the heart of historic downtown Wilmington, Thalian Hall offers a vibrant blend of performance, architecture and community heritage. Whether you are in the mood for a Broadway musical, local theater, a classic film or a touring act, Wilmington's Thalian Hall delivers it all in a beautifully restored historic setting. Thalian Hall is one of America's most prized historic theaters and the only surviving theater designed by 19th century architect, John Montague Trimble. Built from 1855 – 1858, the facility originally served as City Hall and a theater for the Thalian Association, a community troupe founded circa 1788.

The building has been listed on the National Register for Historic Places since 1970. Throughout its life, it has undergone sensitive renovations. Over the years, it has also served as a roller rink, public library, and offices for city staff. A stunning new chandelier named Alice was added in 2010!

The historic main stage seats 550-650 and features state-of-the-art technology blended seamlessly into this historic gem. Five hundred events are hosted annually, including touring Broadway-style shows, music concerts, dance, comedy, cinema, family films and community theater. Thalian Hall's "Pied Piper Theatre" performs annually for over 6,000 first and second graders from surrounding counties with plays fostering an appreciation of live performance and local history.

A \$25 million capital campaign is underway to fund a major transformation supporting a wider range of performance and community engagement. The upcoming project will double the square footage the Hall currently uses and touch every corner of the building on all four floors. Renovations will reactivate the historic city hall portico on Third Street into a coffee house, cocktail bar and performance space, while the south portico on Princess Street will be turned into a stage for outdoor performances in Innes Park.

Consider booking a behind-the-scenes historical tour led by a trained volunteer docent. You will enjoy an in-depth discovery of the theater's rich history, renovation and its performances past and present. You'll walk away with an understanding and appreciation for this architectural and cultural gem.

# Charter Boat Fishing: Plenty of Options Nearby

A group of women from WRP had a wonderful experience on a charter boat fishing trip in May arranged by the WR Boat Club. Two chartered boats with guides operated the trip on the Intracoastal Waterway (ICW) around Sunset Beach. During the half-day outing, the group caught numerous red drum, flounder, and speckled trout. The women were so pleased with the trip they asked for another trip this fall.

## **Local Charter Fishing Trips**

Charter fishing trips are available for both novice and experienced anglers in the offshore waters of the Gulf Stream, nearshore in the ocean waters of Long Bay, and inshore on the ICW and nearby rivers, such as the Lockwood Folly, Cape Fear, and Shallotte rivers. The Boat Club typically arranges men's and women's trips in the summer and fall, but individuals can always make their own arrangements.

Your Fish Tales captains have experience with several of the local charter boat captains and have invited them to speak previously at our yearly fishing seminar. If you are interested in a charter trip, it is best to determine what type of fishing you enjoy before contacting them.

## Inshore, Nearshore or Offshore


Inshore fishing will cost less and is a relaxing experience as the boats are smaller and the waters are calm. If you enjoy being out in the ocean and like to target Spanish mackerel, king mackerel, cobia, and large red drum, nearshore-fishing several miles off the beach is a good fit. Both charter types are typically half-day trips.

Offshore fishing targets pelagic, or oceanic, species such as mahi mahi, wahoo, black fin, and yellow fin tuna, as well as grouper, sea bass and trigger fish on the bottom. Offshore trips are often a full day, sometimes 10-12 hours, due to the distance required to travel 30 plus miles to reach the Gulf Stream depths of over 100 feet. These trips are expensive as a result.

## **Preparing for a Fishing Trip**

Charter trips in the ocean are subject to weather conditions, especially wind and waves. Remember boating in the ocean is always physically demanding. If you have issues with motion sickness, this is not a good option. When considering a fishing charter, use social media to review prices, schedules, and what's included (tackle, fish cleaning, etc.) Be sure to read customers' comments.
